
#### Road Safety Talk

A national geographic film on 'Swachh Bharat Revolution' in India was screened on the 21/10/2021 at 10:00 am.

'Wash your hands with soap and water frequently, clean frequently touched surfaces and objects' are public health measures advised by experts to fight COVID-19. In short, a step towards cleanliness and personal hygiene are significant ways to win this pandemic. The Government of India's Swachh Bharat Mission has started working on these lines years before, even at grass root levels. for the welfare of citizens across the country.

Swachh Bharat Mission (SBM) was launched country-wide in 2014 with the target to eliminate open defecation and achieve better solid waste management in urban and rural India. What seemed impossible for the outer world was made easy by active participation of the people of India and their initiative in achieving this big feat.

SBM has become very crucial at this moment of the pandemic, reminding us all how sanitation and hygiene are crucial to prevent diseases. At the same time the passion with which every village and citizen has adorned this mission making it a people's revolution is also a reminder that nothing is impossible if we the people fight together for a common cause.

After the launch of Swachh Bharat Mission, India's face has transformed from a country with the highest number of people practising open defecation, to more than six lakh villages becoming Open Defecation Free (ODF). The pillars behind the success of this mission are its 6,50,000 volunteers, or *Swachhagrahis*, mostly the youth and women who promoted this at the village level, making it a people's movement.

In order to document such a mass movement, National Geographic channel in collaboration with Ministry of Drinking Water & Sanitation had come together to make a film titled 'Swachh Bharat: India's Sanitary Revolution'. The film was premiered at a special screening for the President of



## Conservation of Water Campaign





The main celebration started at 3 pm with symbolic cutting of chains of discrimination in the hands of our principal Dr Delia Antao.


The comperor for the day was Shivam Bhende and Venancia. Shivam read his Konkani poem which he wrote in the MEAR event of Goa university.

Then there was a street by the team participated in the MEAR event of Goa University.



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## HIV awareness and sensitization:

The students were given a glimpse of the differences between the mental health impact and experiences of individuals living with HIV and those living with HIV-AIDS. Current initiatives and measures undertaken for these individuals by concerned authorities and health care services were also explained to the students.

3.4.3.1 Extension and outreach Programs conducted in collaboration with industry, community, and Non- Government Organizations through NSS/ NCC

#### 1) Talk on Women's Issues at NIE

A talk on Women's Issues was held at the Nirmala Institute of Education on 15th June, 2018 from 9:00am to 10:30am. The speaker was Dr. Shaila de Souza, the HOD for Centre for Women's Studies at the Goa University. The F.Y. B.Ed teacher trainees and faculty members attended the talk. With the help of a PowerPoint presentation, the speaker explained the meaning of patriarchy and its different manifestations in the Indian Society. The difference between patriarchy and matriarchy, the various reasons attached in support of patriarchy even by women and the concept of feminism were areas covered during the course of the talk. The speaker also discussed the Malom Massacre of 2000 and the Manorama Case-2004, thus creating an awareness regarding these acts of impunity carried out under the Armed Forces Special Powers Act (AFSPA), 1958. The Gulabi Gang, a group of Indian women activists in pink sarees and their widespread response to domestic violence against women was discussed.

## 2) Be a Conscious Consumer - Garbage Management

On the 20th of June 2018, a talk on garbage management was conducted by Mr. Clinton Vaz. He emphasised on eco friendly ideas like buying only what is necessary, not wasting any food, composting waste and recycling whenever one can. He motivated the teacher trainees by citing several examples of people abroad who have taken to living an eco friendly lifestyle. Some of the examples include Colin Beavan who uses a bicycle to traverse long distances and lives in an eco friendly house. Chris Jordan, a renowned photographer, depicts garbage affected areas in his pictures. Lastly, Lauren Singer who managed to reduce her garbage rate so drastically that the garbage she generated in an entire year could fit in just one small glass. ## 3) Session on Road Safety

Session on Road Safety On the 24th of July 2018 Mr. Tukaram Shet Mandrekar, the Head Constable of Traffic Cell, Panaji, addressed the teacher trainees of FY.B. Ed and S.Y.D.EL.Ed at Nirmala Institute of Education about road safety. Mr. Mandrekar spoke about traffic vigilance

and explained the safest way of crossing roads. He also enlightened the trainees about 'cyclist permits' about which most were unaware of. Further, he spoke about the validity of motor vehicle licences and the various circumstances under which these may be suspended. Following this session, Mr. Dharmesh Pai Angle Deputy Superintendent of Police addressed the audience with the most accurate statistics update. He drew the attention of the audience to the rising number of fatalities on the state roads and expressed his plea to abide by the traffic rules to avoid accidents. Mr. Angle moved the audience by relating a few tragic cases of road accidents and the impact these had on their families.


#### A) Session on Thalassemia

A talk titled 'Thalassemia: Awareness is the Key' was conducted in Nirmala Institute of Education on 2<sup>nd</sup> August, 2018. The guest speaker, Mr. A.K. Shrivastava gave a brief introduction about the risks and dangers involved with the disorder of Thalassemia. He explained in detail what the disorder was about and how it can affect new born babies. Dr. L'orraine D'Sa, Lecturer in the Pediatric Department of GMC further emphasised that every youngster must get himself/ herself tested for Thalassemia by doing a blood test named He'moglobin Electrophoresis at any hospital or laboratory before choosing a life partner to ensure a healthy future for every child. She concluded the session by enlightening the audience about preventive measures to combat this disorder.

## 5) Nature Protection and Social Health

A talk on Nature Protection and Social Health by a team from Prakriti Suraksha was held on the 30th of August, 2018 from 11.30 to 1.30 pm. at Nirmala Institute of Education, Altinho, Panaji. The session was conducted by Mr. Jeyaram, the secretary of Prakriti Suraksha Organisation. Speaking about Prakriti Suraksha, he said it was established 30 years ago in a small village in Kanyakumari district. This organisation deals with natural farming, natural food and natural medicines. These jobs are taken care of by the widows and the differently abled persons based on their capabilities, thus helping them. A nature drive began on 8th of August from Kanyakumari, thereafter visiting different states of India, conducting seminars at various professional colleges. He encouraged the audience to read the articles on their website, to give feedback in order to achieve greater success. He emphasized on the fact that good food means food without adulteration. He advised to inculcate the habit of having organic food items and to avoid having certain foodstuff sold in the market which could be harmful. The natural food which does not contain poisonous material helps to increase the immunity of the body, which automatically helps us to maintain our health. He stated that we should balance ourselves according to the Indian climatic conditions, adopting our lifestyles and not getting influenced by the west.

A video was shown highlighting nature awareness and the need to protect the environment. It put forth the idea that real development is when we live in a place without disease, a peaceful place to live an intelligent and healthy life in harmony with nature. It also depicted the importance of Ayurvedic medicines, of avoiding the use of plastic which is our greatest concern for pollution, of avoiding cutting trees in the name of development and encouraging the use of biodegradable materials. The earlier generations were quite healthy even in the absence of technology, so he focussed on the point that technology is causing more harm than good. Though the damage has already begun, it is never too late to accept the reality and to be true to ourselves and to live in harmony with nature. The main aim of Prakriti Suraksha organisation is to safeguard nature and promote human life and wellbeing. The session was concluded by the vote of thanks

## 6) Session on Plants

On the 27th of September, 2018 a session on plants was conducted by Mr. Miguel Braganza, Secretary of the Botanical Society of Goa and a prominent public figure always striving to save the green cover of Goa. He conducted a hands-on session for the F.Y. B.Ed students on various methods of gardening..

He enlightened everyone present with practical tips on enriching our soil and getting a blooming garden. The session was followed by the students of Nirmala Institute of Education planting different types of plants (medicinal, fruits, vegetables and ornamental plants) in the garden of the Institute.





## 7) Prevention of Child Sexual Abuse

A talk on the prevention of child sexual abuse was conducted on 11th January 2019 at NIE Lecture hall, from 2.10 to 4.45 by the Muktha foundation which is an organisation committed to prevent interpersonal abuse and promote mental health. This session was conducted at the Nirmala Institute of Education and the speaker for the session was the founder-director of the Muktha foundation, Ashwini N. V. The staff of this foundation is specialised in various fields and the motto of the group is to make child safety a national priority.

The talk began with the importance of being aware about mistreatment of child and a few cases of child abuse were shared by Ashwini M. V. In this regard, some concepts like voyeurism and exhibitionism were explained briefly by the speaker. The speaker spoke in detail about the grooming process used by the abusers to prepare the child for a contact form of abuse. The session also included explanation of the types of child maltreatment like physical and emotional abuse and the speaker spoke at length about contact based sexual abuse and non-contact sexual abuse. Perpetrator behaviour which included verbal abuse and threats of violence were highlighted.

The informative session by the speaker concluded with some effective tips of preventing child abuse like observing the child and asking neutrally about the changed behaviour. Stress was also laid on how important it is for a teacher to understand how warning signs of child maltreatment can be detected. The session ended successfully followed by a few questions.

#### 8) Constitution Day

22<sup>nd</sup> January 2019: The Nirmala Institute of Education, Altinho Panaji had the immense privilege to host an interactive session with students of the Salgaonkar College of Law, in celebration of the 2<sup>nd</sup> State Constitution Week.

The three students Ms. Sanjana, Ms. Aishwarya and Mr. Sitaram were introduced by Dr. Russell D'Souza. The presenters spoke to the B. Ed. students about the Constitution of India, as they tried to raise awareness of this important document among the students as prospective teachers. The Constitution Week is an initiative stared by the Honourable Governor of Goa, Smt. Mridula Sinha to revitalise the feeling of patriotism in each and every citizen of the state.

The presentation touched upon three basic topics; the salient features of the Constitution, the Fundamental Rights of the citizens and the Fundamental Duties and Directive Principles of State Policy. The students were informed about how the constitution came about, and how it was the amalgamation of parts of many constitutions of other countries, as well as the inputs of Indian

lawmakers. It is the longest constitution in the world as it has many provisions to ensure smooth governance.

Many of the terms used in the Constitution, such as "Sovereign", "Socialist", "Secular" were explained to the students as well as the importance of those terms to how our country is governed today. The 6 Fundamental Rights of every citizen as well as the Duties were also explained. It was stressed that along with knowing our rights, it is imperative that we know our duties to our country as well. Our constitution does not enforce the duties on its citizens and thus citizens need to consciously make an effort to comply with the duties prescribed by the constitution to make a better country. The session ended with a small activity to show how we all must work together to reach our goal.

The speakers of the day were very enthusiastic with their presentation and one could see their passion for the constitution shine through. All the speakers were very engaging, interactive, illustrative, relatable, informative and abreast with the current affairs of the country as well as the world. The B. Ed. Students were also engrossed in knowing so many facts about the constitution and actively participated in the discussions. The vote of thanks was proposed by Ms. Christine Mendonza of F. Y. B. Ed.

## 9) Session on Zero Waste Management

A session on Zero Waste Management was held at the Nirmala Institute of Education on 23<sup>rd</sup> January 2019 from 11:00am to 12:00pm. The speaker, Shradda Ramita, was introduced by the Principal of NIE, Sr. Delia Antao. The speaker introduced herself as one of the volunteers for Goa Waste Management Corporation (GWMC). She began the session by briefly explaining the Seventeen Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) given by the UN which include No Poverty, Zero Hunger, Responsible Consumption and Production to name a few

A trailer of the documentary 'Midway' by Chris Jordan was screened. The video showed the saddening story of the deaths of thousands of albatrosses due to accumulation of plastic in their bodies. An animated video of the process of plastic waste formation was also shown. Speaking specifically about Goa, the speaker gave the current facts of the garbage menace in Goa. The speaker stated that Goa generates 800 tons of waste per day and that 90% Goans burn their waste

thus releasing carcinogens into the atmosphere. Images of garbage dumps in Porvorim, Panaji, Margao and Vasco were displayed to show the gravity of improper waste management.

As a solution to the problem, the speaker explained a four way segregation method of dividing waste into categories of Paper and Cardboard; Plastic; Glass and Metal; and Non-Recyclables. She also explained the steps involved in Zero Waste Management namely Reduce, Reuse, Recycle, Recovery, and Landfill. The work going on at the Saligao Waste Treatment Plant was also discussed. Lastly, a video of people's resolution to use metal straws and make it their last straw instead of using plastic ones was screened.

## Abolianchem Fest

The Nirmala Institute of Education, Altinho - Panaji celebrated its second edition of the Abolianchem Fest on 9th February 2019. The celebration commenced with a short play introducing the fest where the abolim flower mascot invited the people to the maand to celebrate the fest. The traditional brass band performance along with a parade set the festive ambience to celebrate Goa in it's uniqueness, at its best. The inaugural ceremony began with the Konkani hymn 'Novo Dis Udetana" to invoke God's blessings. The teacher trainees tuned in their melodious voices to sing the official theme song together with Mr. Carlos Gonsalves which was composed by the teacher trainees of last year's batch with the help of Dr. Glenis Mendonca, Professor at Carmel College, Nuvem and Ms. Eutemia Fernandes, Assistant Professor at Nirmala Institute of Education. The objective of the festival was to document and generate knowledge about the Goan environmental and socio-cultural resources, as well as to share them with the public for sustainable living for the present and future generation. There was also a stall depicting the socio-cultural and economic significance of the coconut tree. The art of Molla making and Abolim hair garlands were depicted at the Fest. A fancy-dress presentation named 'Niz Goemkar' was organized for the primary students to celebrate and preserve the various traditional occupations of Goa. A total of five schools participated namely Bal Bharti Primary School - Ribandar, Immaculate Heart of Mary High School - Goa Velha, Our Lady of Merces School - Panjim, St. Michael's Primary School -Taleigao and People's High School - Panjim. The winners of the fancy dress presentation were People's High School - Panjim (3rd place), Our Lady of Merces School - Panjim (2nd place) and A delightful performance of music Bal Bharti Primary School- Ribandar (1st place) . reverberating with the beautiful sounds of Goa's ghumot was presented by the teacher trainees under the guidance of Mr. Carlos Gonsalves, a renowned percussionist. The teacher trainees performed various Goan traditional dances such as Cotti Fugdi, Dhalo, Kunbi ,Goff and Dekni. 




3.4.3.1 Extension and outreach Programs conducted in collaboration with industry, community, and Non- Government Organizations through NSS/ NCC

## 1) Session on Road Safety

Mr. Tukaram Mandrekar (Head Constable, Traffic Police, Panjim) and Ms. Suvarna Naik (Traffic Police) were invited to give a talk on road safety to the students to make them aware of the traffic rules and persuade them to follow the same. Mr. Mandrekar spoke on the importance of traffic rules that if followed could avoid many accidents and deaths. He also showed some video showcasing the importance of being cautious while following traffic rules right from zebra crossing till driving. It was a very informative talk and motivated the students to follow traffic rules.



## 2) ISSUES RELATED TO WOMEN (POCSO)


Mrs Shaila de Souza gave a session on the topic 'Issues related to women' on 17th June 2019 for the students of F.Y.B.Ed. Mrs. Shaila spoke about the issues faced by every woman in general and how this information would be of help for the trainees as future teachers. She described the recent gender related law – 'Protection of child from sexual offences act, 2012' (POCSO). She also provided the features of this act and stated that this law ensures child friendly measures. The special features covered exclusively by this law were discussed. A

limitation of this law is that it has no preventive measures. Another law spoken about was the India and U.N. convention on the rights of the child, 1989 which was ratified by India on 11/12/92. The Goa children's act was created in 2003. She also reflected on the nation's response to child issues. Further we were informed about 'The juvenile justice act' under which a few cases were discussed. The procedures for reporting cases, consequences of failure in reporting cases and the weaknesses of this act were discussed. In her final words she stated that, 'As teachers we need to know to protect ourselves and our near and dear ones to build a better society.'



#### 3) Consumer Rights

Mr. Roland Martins, an activist and Goa CAN coordinator gave a talk about consumer rights on 21st June, 2019. He made the trainees aware of the different rights available to the consumer. He gave various examples such as the Siolim accident, and the toilets at the KTC premises. He highlighted the prevalent Consumer Protection Act of 1986, wherein he discussed the key concepts in the act. He also had an active question answer session with the F. Y. B.Ed. trainees.



## 4) LEGAL METEROLOGY

Legal metrology is the application of legal requirements to measurements and measuring instruments. Measurements are so much a part of our daily lives that we often take them for granted and possibly don't even notice them. A session was delivered by Mr Nitin Purushan, the Inspector from Legal metrology, Bicholim, Goa. He gave a very informative session. The entire informative talk was about the goods people buy from markets. Their motto is "no less no more". The trainees were shown many videos where people were cheated. After attending this session, the trainees came to know how they get cheated and how they neglect things because they are in a hurry. From this session the trainees got to know that rules are violated. The MRP is hidden by pasting illegal MRP tag and that people are indulging in crime by buying those things.









#### 5) Puppetry Session

Mr Deepak Gaad, a Visual Art Faculty at DIET, Porvorim gave a very interesting session on 28 June, 2019 and showed the importance of puppetry and how it could be used for teaching. He started the session with simple mathematical lines and curves. Thereafter, he gave a brief explanation of different types of puppetry such as finger puppet, paper puppet, mask puppet, string puppet, rod puppet and shadow puppet caricatures. The speaker kept the students engrossed with his skilful artwork. He advised the trainees to use the right combination of colours to create an impact on the minds of the children and also to use flash cards in their teaching. A short three minutes film on puppetry was shown to create social awareness on AIDS. This session was organized for the F. Y. B.Ed. trainees.





### 6) Session By Alcoholics Anonymous

A talk was organized on alcoholism in collaboration with Alcoholic Anonymous to highlight the evils of drinking in our society on July 10, 2019. The session started with sharing of true-life experiences by the survivors who had encounters with alcoholism. It was really heart breaking to hear how they fell for this evil vice and the trauma they underwent before they could overcome this menace with the help of Alcoholic Anonymous. Various speakers spoke about how it all started and how it adversely affected their family life. All the speakers were of the view that Alcoholism is a family disease. It tears the family apart. It brings shame, violence and destroys peaceful existence in the family. Alcoholic Anonymous reaches out to these families to build a new home. Alcoholism Hurts, Al-Anon Heals. Al-Anon is self-supporting through its own voluntary contributions. Their only purpose is to help the families of alcoholics. They do this by practising twelve steps, by welcoming and giving comfort to families of alcoholics and by giving understanding and encouragement to the alcoholic.

### 7) LGBTQ Awareness

Goa Rainbow Trust organized a session to enlighten the community about the nomenclature of the LGBTQ community and the struggles they face in the society due to criticism from the people at large. Veda Bhatt and Ivan Cordo gave the history of GRT. They want to establish themselves in Goa as there is no such recognition here. The law does not allow such groups to move freely. They made the trainees aware that such type of people ought to be accepted and need recognition. The society needs to understand such people and help them to adjust to

life and living. One of the members gave his personal experience when he felt and discovered he was gay after going through a lot of references on the Internet. His friends and peers in college did not accept him and he felt ignored in the society. He felt that on the whole the society does not accept them and looks down on them.





### **8)** GENDER SENSITIZATION DAY

Gender Sensitization Day was celebrated on 19th September, 2019. The day started off with an assembly which was based on the theme LOVE. The group members through the medium of prayer, dance and song, conveyed the message that love is a supreme and divine emotion and we need not do great things, but small things with great love towards our neighbours. A cultural programme was held with the theme BREAKING GENDER STEREOTYPES. The programme commenced with the screening of the video which conveyed the message that God created all human beings in His own image and likeness and it is humans who have created differences among themselves. The students then enacted various scenes depicting how society holds stereotypes towards males, females and transgenders. The scenes were then rewound and showed how society would function without stereotypes. # Four Day workshop on Upgrading of Teaching Methodology using Elements of Theatre at NIE

### 4th March 2020 - Day One

The day began with the formal Inaugural function where the theatre experts who were the speakers for the sessions to be conducted were welcomed. Mementos were given to the guest speakers. The Officiating Principal Dr. Sr. Delia Antao and the director Dr. Sr. Rita Paes were also welcomed. The formal Inaugural ended at around 10:00 am soon after which the first session began. The first activity conducted byMr. Vidyanidhee Vanarase called "Stop, Walk, Jump", aimed at improving concentration as well as breaking childhood clichéd associations of certain actions with certain words. The second activity included shaking hands with anyone at the venue. This activity brought out the essence of enjoying rather than competing in whatever you do in life.

The other speaker who was Mr. K. G. Krishnamurthy explained how theatre is a democratic process which teaches oneness and equality. The idea of the circle formation to enhance the exchange of knowledge was emphasized. Theatre in Education involves learning and doing which should become an experience for children. Thus, theatre then becomes magical and not a subject.

The Theatre Faculty then divided the group using the random number method to form six distinct groups which were then instructed to discuss their ideas of theatre, education and theatre in education which was to be presented later through any means like a speech, drama, digital method, mime, etc. There were no restrictions on the method of presentation.

This was a very fruitful activity as the <u>students</u> were able to interact and come up with brilliant ideas. The feedback given mainly included eradicating the use of explaining a scene either before or after the act is performed. An inclusive performance where the audience is an active part of the play was appreciated.

The post lunch session began with a stretching exercise which helped refresh the mind and body. The group was again divided into six distinct groups which were then instructed to create a role play from any Panchatantra or fantasy literature. This role play however could not include any human characters at all. After half an hour of preparation time, each group presented their play for not more than ten minutes. Stories like The Hare and the Tortoise, The Lion and the Rat, The Rabbit and the sky falling, Beauty of the Rose, The Elephant and the Ants were adapted and presented using simple props. The feedback received was positive and the performances were better than the presentations during the first session in the morning. There were lesser words and more expressions that were natural that made the plays very interesting and captivating. The element of human nature and feelings in inanimate objects was highly appreciated. It was an enjoyable day working with new people, making friends, exchanging ideas along with lots of learning through fun and meaningful activities conducted by the resource persons.

### 5th March 2020 - Day Two

The second day of the workshop began with an activity which depicted 'Passion v/s Profession'. A few students were randomly selected to portray why their subject was important and were asked to defend the same. The subjects chosen were Commerce, Biology, Performing Arts, Hindi and History. The resource persons further enlightened the crowd about the importance of passion in our career without which teachers would not do justice to the vocation. The session was extremely interactive and most of the individual presentations of the various subjects listed above led to a debate and discussion which included interesting questions and arguments by the audience. Due to these arguments the Faculty emphasized on the importance of conflict in drama.

For the second session, the participants were paired with individuals they did not know anything about and were given thirty minutes to get to **know their partner** soon after which they were asked to introduce themselves as their partners in front of the audience. Through this we learnt that unnecessary body movements, repeated hand gestures or looking at the ceiling or floor can lead to major distractions. Hence, we must always be aware of our every moment when addressing an audience.

Post lunch, the students were divided into six groups. Each group was given a topic and asked to improvise and then perform on stage. The topics were **Arrival**, **Journey and Destination**. Since there were six groups, two groups had the same topic. However, their interpretation of the allotted topic differed. The resource persons then gave a detailed feedback to each group, making suggestions as required after which the workshop concluded for the day.

### 6th March 2020 - Day Three

The first session of the day, conducted by Mr. K. G. Krishnamurthy, dealt with **personification**. The participants were split into groups and a member of each group was given a character/object to impersonate. The other members were then free to cross question the character's back-story. Mr. Krishnamurthy emphasized that this technique could be used to impart knowledge and create interest in the subject.

In the next session, the participants paired up to perform an improvisation based on a **dialogue** specified by Mr. Vidyanidhee Vanarase. While the dialogue was common to all the pairs, the context and situation could be manipulated by the participants.

After lunch, the last session for the day was conducted, the participants were divided into six groups based on their subjects and then were instructed to perform a **subject based improvisation**. The objective of this exercise was to allow the participants to infuse theatrical creativity into their teaching content.

### 7th March 2020 - Day four

The first session of the day dealt with **creation of a scene** according to a given topic. The participants must go one at a time and perform an individual action continuously and the next participant must create their own individual action related to the given topic and it followed in this way. The next session was similar but this time the action was static. This activity is called 'photo frame'. Random students were selected and they had to create a tableau according to any lesson from their respective subjects. Then a short session on the

interpretation of nursery rhymes or poems and the history/ truth behind it were presented by a few students.

After lunch we gathered together for a few voice exercises by Mr. Vidyanidhee Vanarase, which included simple deep breathing, phonetics- the sounds in the Hindi and Konkani script, mouth exercises and voice manipulation with a few lines in Sanskrit that were repeated after him. Then Mr. K.G Krishnamurthy asked us to lie down on the floor and breathe and release making loud sounds from the phonetic script we used before.

After the tea break, the valedictory function began at 5:00 pm. The guests were welcomed. A video compiled by Ms. Celesta Saldanha show cased the happenings of the workshop through a lovely collection of pictures put together. Feedback was taken. Reviews of the workshop were given. Mr. Vidyanidhee Vanarase was asked to share his experiences from the past few days at the workshop. The Chief Guest Mrs. Josalkar addressed the audience of theatre enthusiasts soon after which certificates were given to every college. The vote of thanks was given by the Officiating Principal of Nirmala Institute of Education, Dr. Delia Antao. The College Anthem was sung and the function ended.


### 1) Talk on Women's Rights

However, the Women's Commission does not have the power to punish the respondent. If the issue is serious, it should be taken to court for further intervention. If women are being sexually, emotionally, or physically harassed at their workplace, they have the right to file a complaint at the police station or reach out to the Women's Commission.

Various forms of harassment are also seen among the youth. She mentioned various instances where teenagers are trapped in abusive relationships. In these situations, counsellors play a vital role in helping students understand the situation in a better manner. She moved on to explain how to understand oneself better. We need to be aware of our emotions; it is only then that we will be able to deal with the people around us in a much more civilised manner. She also mentioned that cybercrimes are on the rise and that one needs to be vigilant.

Mrs. Ketki concluded the session by advising the audience to spend more time with their mothers. We must enjoy the little moments of joy around us. The session ended at about 4:30 p.m.



### 2) Session on Road Safety

A session on Road safety was conducted by Mr. Tukaram S. Mandrekar (RTO Officer) on August 1, 2022, at 11:30 a.m. in the Conference Room. He was introduced by Sir Russell D'Souza (faculty).

Sir Tukaram began the session by questioning us on the basics of traffic and what different terms mean. He then moved on to inform us about the various accidents that have taken place over the past decade. He focused on the fatal accidents that have occurred over a period of time. A table was displayed to us that had information about the number of deaths that have taken place due to accidents. There are various categories of different age groups, and the highest numbers of deaths were among people roughly between the ages of 20 and 40.. It is at this age that careers and lives settle, and yet our minds at times fail to be responsible riders or drivers. He spoke about how underage people who are not eligible to hold a licence often get into trouble. They avoid wearing helmets. He says that wearing a helmet must be for one's safety. He further mentioned to us the Motor Vehicles (Amendment) Act, 2019. This act has been implemented in 2022. It takes a while to implement these amendments, as they need to conduct studies and research to find out about the various situations. Hence, this year we have noticed a rise in the amount of the fines. He also differentiated between challan and e-challan. The e-challan provides the details of the person who owns the bike with a click of a button. He showed us the mandatory, cautionary, and informative signs. These sign boards are seen at various points along the road. It is necessary to follow these, as it maintains some form of discipline on the road. He provided us with details about the various signs. He told us how to cross the road and that pedestrians must walk in the opposite direction of the oncoming traffic. He explained the various consequences that one would have to face if they violated any of the rules.

He concluded with a question round and distributed an informative book. The session ended at 1:20 p.m.

Dr. Yeravde started the lecture by highlighting the ways the higher education system in India works and what university education provides. He emphasised the different health conditions such as mental health,

physical inactivity, sleep disorders, and the various problems of availability, accessibility, and affordability. Dr. Yeravde explained the different factors influencing learning outcomes and how universities should develop into model health-promoting units. The motto of the Ottawa Charter for Health Promotion 1986 was stated, and the 8 Standards of Practise for Health Promotion were dealt with in brief. Dr. Yeravde spoke about the importance of enabling health, wellbeing, and sustainable development and focused on the three main areas. Integrating health and sustainability into the core business

The settings-based approach (SBA) given by the WHO and its objectives, such as improving primary care, the social environment, a healthy physical environment, developing links with the community, a supportive campus environment, and youth-centric activities, were brought to our

attention. Reasons for investing in health-promoting universities, policy formulation, The various challenges and problems were briefly explained and ended at 10:45. The lecture was followed by a question-and-answer session and a brief discussion on the above topic.

The Lecture was informative and well explained. It led the students to think about how health, be it physical or mental, can have an impact on our learning process and how we can help create health-promoting universities.

### 4) Vegetable Seed Sowing

The Eco Club of Nirmala Institute of Education organised a Vegetable Seed Sowing activity on the 4th of August, 2022 in the college campus. The activity was organised with the initiative of Sr. Olga Vaz, Vice President of DHM, in collaboration with ICAR, Ela Farm, Old Goa. This activity was guided by Mr Amay Naik, (Field Assistant Manager, ICAR) and Mr Sidhant Vangarmak, (Assistant Technology Manager, ICAR) in the presence of the Eco club mentors, Ms Daniella Colaco and Mrs Shylaja Sherief, Ms Myra Ribeiro, (Admin staff, NIE) and gardener Mr Dilip Kankonkar. The main purpose of this activity was to teach the members the techniques in sowing and nurturing different types of crops. The various ways of raking the soil to prepare the beds for sowing and the technique to treat the seeds using fungicides before sowing was demonstrated. They were also briefed on tips to nurture a plant post sowing. Seeds of bitter gourd, palak, maize, radish, ladyfinger, ash gourd and pumpkin were sown by the members of the Eco club during this activity.


## 6) Ornamental Plants Sale

## 7) Talk on 'Environmental Destruction'

The Eco club of Nirmala Institute of Education organised a talk on 'Environmental Destruction' for the teacher trainees of F.Y B.Ed and the faculty members at 3:15 p.m in Hall 1, on 29<sup>th</sup> September 2022. The resource person for the talk was Dr. (Fr.) Bolmax Pereira, Assistant Professor in Botany at St. Joseph Vaz College, Cortalim. He is an eco- activist and an eminent

personality who has contributed immensely on the issues concerning environmental destruction in Goa. His formal introduction was given by one of the teacher trainees, Ms. Andria Antao.

He mainly focused on the projects which are causing harmful effects to our surrounding. The main aim was to spread awareness among people about saving our environment from various destructive activities.

He briefly spoke about the historical overview of land management. In pre-colonial times it was based on the Gaunkari system followed by the Communidade in Colonial set up. Furthermore, he informed us about the seven rivers that are going to be nationalised. In his address, he gave special emphasis on the three linear projects; the Highway project, Transmission line and the Railway project which will lead to deforestation of over 170 hectares of cover at the Mollem National Park and the Bhagwan Mahavir Wildlife Sanctuary, the lungs and the biodiversity of the State. Dr. Bolmax Pereira has been strongly raising voice against these projects. These projects will kill the 'lungs of Goa'. However, in April 2021 Supreme Courts Central Empowered Committee (CEC) red -flagged the double tracking project.

He emphasised about the coal issue which is one of the major concerns as about 34,200 tonnes of coal is transported each day. He highlighted that the coal dust can directly affect our lungs leading to disease like pneumoconiosis. He concluded by recommending some solutions in order to preserve forest and save Goa from environmental destruction.

In conclusion, he enlightened us about the important theme and also made us aware about the current happenings where in the so-called developmental projects are soon changing the beautiful face of our Goa. He also shared alarming facts about the changes that might happen in the future due to degradation of the environment. He spoke from his own experiences and stated, "Get Involved Or Get Lost", which meant it's high time that we should work towards saving Our Mother Earth and our beautiful Goa or else our future generations will be at stake. The session ended by a brief vote of thanks which was proposed by teacher trainee, Sr. Cerena Vaz.

Teacher Trainee Jubby proposed the vote of thanks.



Keeping in sync with the importance of Gandhian thoughts about cleanliness. The purpose of the campaign is to instil in each of us a sense of duty and obligation towards safeguarding nature, as teacher trainees, it is our moral responsibility to inculcate in our students habits that will sustain the well being of self and one's surrounding.

From July 1, 2022, the government of India banned single-use plastic items that have low utility but are frequently littered around, such as plastic straws. The aim of the ban is to curb plastic pollution, since single-use plastic harms terrestrial and aquatic ecosystems. India's ban on single-use plastic items includes straws, cutlery, ear buds, packaging films, plastic sticks for balloons, candy and ice-cream, and cigarette packets, among other products.

The trainees were given a demo on how to make a paper bag and a cloth bag upcycling an old t-shirt. Trainees Eden and Sera facilitated the demonstrations, wherein the students did their own stitch-less cloth bag.




#### 14) L.I.F.E. Workshop held at Nirmala Institute of Education - Altinho (DAY-1)

#### Day 2






Post Tea break, there was a prize distribution for the activities held on both the days of the workshop followed by the felicitation of the Alumni members with tokens of appreciation and certificates.

The hosts for the celebration were Miss Rhea Elaine Rodrigues and Miss Joyce Mascarenhas.








west coast of India. As someone who has been studying about water for the last 16 years, he

talked about how around 2 billion people don't have access to fresh water and have to resort to

drinking contaminated water every day. He further said that domestic sewage is a major

contributor to the water pollution along with fertilizers and pesticides used for agriculture.

Everyone should be aware of where our sewage is going and how we might be unknowingly

contributing to water pollution. In his message to the students he said that water should be high

on our agenda and we should not take it for granted just because we have an unlimited supply of

it for now as it might not last forever.

The pre-primary teacher trainees performed a puppet show with Ollie the octopus on a mission to

collect seaweed searching for helping hands. After searching for a while he meets a crab who tells him that it is not necessary to find a hand to pick seaweed as long as you're doing what you

can and encourage each other.

The D.El. Ed. section performed a comedy song titled 'Income Tax'. Juwel Pereira and Delilah

Dias entertained the audience with a song. The students of the D.El.Ed section presented a

beautiful quartet titled, 'Anvde Tuje Sopoi'

Mr .Elvis Goes, a well-known singer and the recipient of the Yuva Srujan Puroskar spoke about

his love for Konkani songs. He also conducted an impromptu music session for the visitors.

#### Field Trip to Dr. Salim Ali Bird Sanctuary, Chorao-Goa.

Nirmala Institute of Education, Altinho-Panjim in association with the Goa Forest Department and Arranya Environment Research Organization (an NGO) organised a field trip to Dr. Salim Ali Bird Sanctuary, Chorao-Goa as part of activities to creating awareness about the Importance of Mangrove and Coastal Ecosystem in mitigation of climate change & providing livelihood opportunities to local communities.

A total of 20 students from Nirmala Institute of Education were chosen to attend this field trip. The field trip began at the Sanctuary with a briefing by a group of resource persons who guided the group throughout the session. They emphasised the significance and how mangroves are an integral part of the coastal ecosystem, how mangroves provide shelter and breeding grounds and how local communities integrated fauna and flora wealth obtained from mangroves into their livelihoods.

The trip continued with a Boat ride in two batches of students around the mangroves during which the teacher novices were taught how to observe and identify the different types of fishes, birds and insects that are indigenous to Goa's mangrove ecosystem.

The different species identified during the boat trail included Eel, Hermit crab, Mud crab, Great Egret, Collared kingfisher, Flying fox(bat), Common Red Shanks (bird), Green Pigeon, Indian Cormorants, Meck Sparrows, Sand pipers and many more. The session was accompanied by facts about these species and cues on how to identify them.

The trip ended with the members of Arranya Environment Research Organization encouraging the Nirmala Teacher novices to join in the movement for Conservation and awareness and to influence many more such likeminded people to do the same.
